Divine Mercy Sunday / Second Sunday of Easter, 6th/7th April, 2024 (Year B)

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

In our readings this weekend we hear of one of the final recorded encounters between the risen Christ and his followers. The experiences of Mary, Peter and John that have come before today's account have announced extraordinary happenings, but the full extent has not quite reached the disciples gathered in our reading. They are locked away out of fear. In that state, Jesus comes and stands among them. The narrator of our account makes the point that the doors were locked and so the inference we draw is that Jesus becomes present regardless, through the locked doors. The Light that broke into the darkness of the world attested to at the beginning of the Gospel is evoked here again. Now it is the risen Christ that is breaking into a place of fear and powerlessness.

The disciples expressed fear for their particular reasons, but we all sit in places of fear and darkness at one point or another. We all bear the weight of sin; both our own or others and so experience life in a diminished way. However, in Christ, God has entered into those things, into the darkness of sin itself and risen through it.

As we move through this season, we are being asked to reflect and find anew the meaning of Easter – and here we have it. The resurrection of Christ is a victory over all that the crucifixion represents. Jesus' death on the cross represents the worst of humanity; injustice, ignorance, anger, hatred, intolerance, violence and fear. Moreover, the cross represents the cost of such things, the cost of sin as it were. Jesus' resurrection is God's transformation of such things to places of healing, light and life.

The risen Christ enters places of fear and darkness and offers peace. Twice in the reading Jesus states, 'Peace be with you' and, recalling earlier dialogue from John's Gospel, it is peace of a profound kind. Not simply 'as the world gives it' (John 14:27), but one that transcends any time, place and circumstance. Further, the encounter of the risen Christ is transformative. When Jesus 'breaks in' to their midst, the disciples experience joy and, further, receive the breath of Christ; the Holy Spirit which allows them to, in turn, 'break out' from their place of fear and hiding and bring this very experience of Christ to the world.

That is indeed a beautiful witness to us. However, John seems to be anticipating one likely response to all this. Perhaps it is all a bit 'too good to be true'. We have doubt. It is well known that John's Gospel is the last written of the four of the New Testament. Its final form was written after the first generation Christians had passed and the audience of such a gospel message do not have the luxury of 'first-hand experience'. They, like us, are relying heavily on the witness of others that have come before. John is aware that belief will enter a different order as the Church continues to grow through new eras. It is not surprising that belief, and its close cousin doubt, are repeated themes throughout and feature in the concluding sections. As Thomas enters the scene, doubt and belief are given a stronger voice. Thomas has heard the good news, first told through Mary of Magdala and now added to with the witness of those present in the locked room. But it is not enough. He wants his own encounter. Like Thomas, we can find ourselves in a similar position. We have heard the testimony; we have

some understanding of it all. Based on that, we would like to believe that Christ, the presence of God found fully human, has entered into the reality of sin and has emerged victorious. Further, we would like to believe that this power can be found and felt still today. But such belief is not always easy. We doubt for all sorts of reasons. Is the Risen Christ legitimate? Is this power of God real? Perhaps even more poignantly, we might ask, 'Is this Christ for me'? Thomas represents for us those places and moments when we find ourselves in such a state where such questions are asked.

The answer to such questions in the words of Christ, the witness of the first followers and the millions that have come after is 'yes'! This power is real, the Risen Christ is victory indeed. And, yes, this Christ is for you and for me. When Thomas expressed his doubt, he wasn't chided because of it. Rather, he was invited to encounter Jesus in a more profound way. We are invited to do similar, to put shape to our doubt and seek the risen Christ more fully. However, the encounter we must seek is one of faith. Not blind mindlessness that can be the pejorative assumption of belief in Christ. But, rather, a mindful active and seeking faith. One open to the possibilities of God's loving action. Deep prayer, sacramental engagement, being attentive to Church teaching, and using our gifts in thoughtful participation in our world. In service as well. As we seek to bring love and justice in great or small ways, we will encounter the light of the Lord. As we open ourselves up to Jesus' presence in our lives and as we breath deeper the Holy Spirit, we can experience the transformative love of God.

Thus, like those first disciples, as the season of Easter unfolds, may we find ourselves surprised by the risen Christ's presence and experience the great joy and peace that only God can give.

Corpus Christi Procession


